IMPORTANT! Parent Consent Survey

Parents, please complete the Parental Consent Form for your child/children. Parental consent allows the student to receive health services from the school nurse while at school, to include care and treatment for illness and injury. **This includes giving medication approved to be administered at school.** This DOES NOT

AUTHORIZE: Invasive screening or procedure (COVID-19 testing, blood draw, vaccinations, etc.), preventative health care, medication administration, mental health counseling, therapy (physical therapy, occupational therapy, etc.), or other services that have traditionally required specific direction and consent (administration of medication, medical procedures, medical management of chronic health conditions, etc.).

FAQ and Related Information

- 1. What services does the requested parental consent cover?
 - The services traditionally provided by St. Johns County school nurses, including first aid, nursing assessment, health appraisal, meeting emergency health needs, nutrition assessment, referral of students to appropriate health treatment, health counseling and emergency treatment.
- 2. What services are <u>not</u> covered by the requested consent?
 - Invasive screening or procedure (COVID-19 testing, blood draw, vaccinations, etc.)
 - Preventative health care
 - Medication administration
 - Mental health counseling
 - Therapy (physical therapy, occupational therapy, etc.)
 - Other services that have traditionally required specific direction and consent (administration of medication, medical procedures, medical management of chronic health conditions, etc.)
- 3. Why require a consent for the school nurse and school clinic now?
 - The District is requesting the consent at this time to comply with the Parents' Bill of Right as interpreted by the Florida Department of Health.
- 4. Will students receive emergency treatment if parents decline to sign the release?
 - Yes. In the event of a medical emergency, school nurses and staff will respond appropriately as necessary to protect the student's health and safety given the circumstances of the emergency. The school will contact the parents, or in their absence, the student's emergency contacts on file with the school so that they can make the necessary care and treatment decisions.

Dear Parents/Guardians,

With the increase in COVID-19 numbers and need to make sure we are timely with our communication, we are asking parents to use an online form to report a positive student and we will adjust how we communicate with you regarding a positive COVID-19 case on campus.

To notify us of your child's positive COVID-19 test result we are requesting that you complete the Optional Positive Student Reporting Form located here: https://forms.office.com/Pages/ResponsePage.aspx?id=V9CzsxL8P0-S9HK-boRDUdd7PTxJF7NMpeGQuOXX5S5UOURZS1gyRERDN1pUOFZPOVFMWkhRNTdCSy4u However, should you feel you need to discuss your child's COVID-19 scenario in detail, please feel free to bypass the form and call the District COVID Support Team at 904-547-8230.

When we receive information regarding a positive student, we will communicate to <u>all</u> parents in the classroom that there has been a positive case in your child's class. In the past, we have only communicated to close contacts. By making this adjustment, we can notify parents faster and more efficiently.

We continue to ask you to monitor your child for symptoms and keep them home if they are not well. We want students to be in school learning and we also want children healthy and safe. We are in this together and will continue to work together to navigate this new normal.

First Lady Casey DeSantis Announces 2022 Black History Month Student and Educator Contests

Student essay contest winners will receive a 4-Year Florida College Plan scholarship provided by the Florida Prepaid College Foundation

First Lady DeSantis is inviting students to participate in academic and creative contests throughout the month. Students in grades K-3 can participate in an art contest and students in grades 4-12 can participate in an essay contest. Additionally, students, parents, teachers and principals are invited to nominate full-time educators of all student grades for the Black History Month Excellence in Education Award.

About the Student Art Contest

First Lady Casey DeSantis' Black History Month Art Contest is open to all K-3 students in Florida. Each student will submit original, two-dimensional artwork based on this year's theme. Two winners will be selected.

About the Student Essay Contest

First Lady Casey DeSantis' Black History Month Essay Contest is open to all grade 4-12 students in Florida. Each student will submit one essay no longer than 500 words based on this year's theme. Three winners will be selected: one elementary school student (grades 4-5), one middle school student (grades 6-8) and one high school student (grades 9-12). Each winner will receive a 4-Year Florida College Plan scholarship provided by the Florida Prepaid College Foundation.

About the Excellence in Education Award

First Lady Casey DeSantis' Black History Month Excellence in Education Award Contest is open to all full-time educators in an elementary, middle or high school in Florida. Three winners will be selected: one elementary school teacher (grades K-5), one middle school teacher (grades 6-8) and one high school teacher (grades 9-12). Nominations may be submitted by a principal, teacher, parent/guardian or student.



Ways a Parent Can Help with

READING

Let your child see you reading!

Have magazines and books in your home.

Help your child find appropriate word & reading games on the computer.

Keep a dictionary on hand. Help your child look up new words they read or hear. 3

Read mysteries with your child and try to figure out the clues together.

Movie version coming out?

Read the book together first, then talk about which you each liked better. Set aside a time and place for your child to read -

like a comfy chair and a reading light in a quiet place Visit your public library regularly.

Look for and read together the books that were your favorites when you were a kid.

Encourage your child to write -

letters, thank you notes, emails, journals, lists, stories about their own trips, events, and daily life

Ask your child to draw a comic strip about what happens in the story.

Provide word searches, crossword and other word games and puzzles, or help your child make his/her own Ask your child questions about what he or she is reading, such as:

- What is the story about?
- Who are the important characters in the story?
- Where does the story take place?
- Why do you think the character made that choice?
- Why did that happen?
- How did you know about ...?
- Would you recommend this book to your friends?



Share with your child about what you're reading... and encourage your child to do the same

Ways a Parent Can Help with

MATH

1

Look for shapes and patterns in real life Have your child measure ingredients for a recipe you are making

Ask your child to explain the math skills he or she is working on in school

When helping your child with homework or school assignments, ask him or her to explain how he or she got an answer

Help your child find some appropriate number and problem-solving games to play online

Play card
or board games
that involve
counting or
patterns

Ask your child to count change at the grocery store, or to estimate the total cost while you are shopping 8

Compare:

Which is the tallest?
...the heaviest?
...the longest?
...the smallest?
...the fastest?
...the hottest?

...the most expensive?

Have tools such as a ruler, a scale, a calculator, and a measuring tape available to use in your house

Encourage your child to track or graph scores or stats for a favorite sports team

Use dice or playing cards to make a game out of practicing math facts



Point out ways math is part of "real" life: money, computers, music, art, construction, cooking...
